

Adolescents' and Parents' Perceptions of News Media and Youth Bullying: A Qualitative Study

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INTRODUCTION

- Parents and adolescents are often exposed to youth bullying stories, such as the cases of Megan Meier and Tyler Clementi, which are often dramatized and propagated through news media in print and online
- Little is known about adolescents' and parents' views on news media coverage of youth bullying experiences
- Exposure to these stories may impact how parents interact with their children regarding bullying experiences



PURPOSE

The purpose of this study was to understand adolescents' and parents' perceptions of news articles related to youth bullying.

METHODS

This study received approval from the University of Wisconsin-Madison IRB.

Setting and Subjects

- Adolescent-parent dyads recruited at two primary care clinics in the Midwest
- Eligible participants:
- Adolescents between ages 15 and 18 years old
- Parent or guardian of an adolescent between ages of 15 to 18 years old
- Able to read English
- After informed consent, adolescents and parents were separated into different rooms for their individual interviews

METHODS CONT.

Interview Procedure

 Interviews included reading example news media articles regarding youth bullying with follow-up questions about their perceptions of the articles

"What specific information seems helpful or not helpful to you?"

Participants were also asked to share their views after being shown examples of feedback from other teens on the example articles

"If you compare the first and second article why do think there were differences in how people rated the article's helpfulness?"

Article Selection

- Content analysis to identify bullying and cyberbullying news articles over last 5 years
- **Delphi method** to gain consensus on articles that represented fearbased versus public health-oriented reporting

Two articles ranked highest on fear-based and public healthoriented reporting by the Delphi method were selected

Analysis

vg. age = 16.05

(SD = 1.00)

Avg. age = 49.20

(SD = 6.78)

 Qualitative thematic analysis utilizing the constant comparative approach was conducted by three coders

RESULTS CONT.

Participant Information

20 adolescent-parent dyads (n = 40)

CONCLUSIONS

Main Findings

- Adolescents and parents perceived news media articles focused on bullying prevention and incorporating facts as valuable to them
- Participants also noted that emotional, single-story news media articles related to bullying were not helpful to them

<u>Implications</u>

 To maximize helpfulness of bullying news media to adolescents and parents, researchers could partner with journalists and other stakeholders to create guidelines around strategic reporting of these stories and bullying prevention efforts


